Creating a shared cultural history

The Papunya School Book of Country and History can be used as an example of how to create a shared cultural history with the local community. Purchasing this book provides educators with multiple ways to explore Indigenous history and culture with children. The links in this resource will assist educators to locate local indigenous groups to begin the process of creating strong, collaborative relationships, through respecting and valuing Indigenous culture. This resource focuses on the Southern Queensland/Sunshine Coast region however other regions can be sourced through the provided links. This activity will assist in developing a strong focus for reconciliation. Additional website are included for sourcing factual historical information of both Indigenous and European history. Creation of a similar book would be a long term project. Stand-alone activities that can be of

use to educators are listed.

Collaborative art works: Murals/Explore Indigenous symbols & their meaning/Traditional painting methods & materials

Story maps/Journey Maps/Visual print walks

Shared historical timeline maps: Identify familiar localities and events from Indigenous and European history Map them in an ongoing activity

Locality Mapping: Map the Indigenous localities, traditional owners and language groups in your region or state

Sharing of cultural and historical stories: Invite Indigenous Elders to share Dreaming stories & local cultural history/Engage in yarning circles/Invite local historians to share similar stories
